Highlights of the February 5, 2019 Open Board Meetings

<u>Chairman's Comments</u> – Hope thanked everyone for attending the Hot Topic session on January 30th. Three topics were covered and great ideas and comments were received. A summary of the topics is posted on the bulletin board.

Secretary's Report: June Cavendish

A motion was made to accept the minutes from the January 8, 2019 open board meeting. The motion was seconded by Barry Rutz. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: Anne King

The Finance Committee has reviewed the year end statements from DRM and approved them. The report shows that we will end the year with a deficit of \$1,700. Our Reserve fund currently has a balance of \$522,000.

Anne reported that the statements sent out by DRM were not correct. They failed to include the electrical charges. New statements were issued.

Our main insurance package and the earthquake policy have been renewed. Anne made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report. Kurt Neumann seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Carolyn reminded everyone to turn in your ballots for the March election. We need a quorum in order to hold the election. Water testing is currently being done and will report the results at the next general meeting. A part time housekeeping employee has been hired for February and March. This article was in the newsletter last year.....it bears repeating.

The Five "C's" of the Architectural Committee (AC)

- Committee The five members of the AC meet weekly during the months of November through March of the winter season. We process between 5-10 work orders each week. To be a part of the AC, each member must be an owner.
- Continuation History has a place in our committee. We discuss what's been approved in the past and apply that knowledge to new ideas. We want to keep moving forward through changes that compliment the current while keeping a continuation of history in our view.
- Continuity As a committee, we look at each rule and discuss the options for interpretation. We see the value in agreeing with one interpretation to keep a consistent existence of these subjective rules.
- 4. **Communication** We are out in the park to serve each home owner. We communicate with owners to explain, define, and apply the

rules to their individual and sometimes unique requests for changes.

 Consistency – Each week we discuss the work orders by applying logic and fairness to the requested change. We keep the conformity of the rules when deciding to approve or disapprove a work order.

Please continue to up-grade your lots. We all benefit from changes that are new and refreshing.

BUILDING & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

I continue to speak about 'Volunteerism", an important feature of the unique culture of the Desert Aire community. Other RV communities in the Coachella Valley often tout their spirit of volunteering but when the members of those communities experience Desert Aire, they often say "Wow!". We all know the Desert Aire spirit ofvolunteering covers nearly all aspects of our life style. However, my personal experience comes through being Chairman of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, thus the focus of my comments.

I have previously talked about how through volunteers, a few years ago, we were able to construct a new Pickle Ball Court for only the cost of materials at a fraction of contractor bids. Our volunteers, part of the Building and Grounds committee, come from an amazing cross section of skills and professions. Volunteer does not mean substandard design or work. Over the

years there have been several projects of equal or larger scale accomplished by our Volunteers.

Currently, as you travel the boulevard, you will notice construction of two new Horseshoe Pits. This work is being accomplished by Desert Aire volunteers for the price of materials. The new pits are being constructed to the exact standards of the Professional Horseshoe Pitchers Association. We are confident the quality of work by our volunteers exceeds what we would purchase.

If you travel a bit further on the boulevard, you will see another project by volunteers as they build additional Bocce Ball courts. For those of us not familiar with Bocce Ball, it is an education to observe the detail and perfection that is being expended in the construction. When the new courts are complete, the volunteers will rebuild the old courts with new materials and the same detail.

Another crew of volunteers are working at building two new gates for Lot 4. One will go by the dumpsters at the end of the hedge. The second will be at the entrance to Lot 4 at the Boulevard. All steel is on hand and construction is underway. Once those gates are completed, the security of Desert Aire will be enhanced significantly Beyond the obvious of enhancing our life style and helping to keep our HOA's as low as possible, volunteering offers the satisfaction of doing something well that is of benefit to the whole community. In addition, you will meet many wonderful folks and may gain new knowledge and skills.



Fun Facts:

In our park, we have two kinds of drainage systems. In our recent heavy rains, you were able to witness first hand both in action. There are 35 small grates (7×14.5) located at various curbside locations throughout the park. These are drywells and only percolate the moisture into the ground. They are 6 to 8 feet deep. Please do

not hose dirt and leaves into these grates. Sweep up dirt and debris and place it in your garbage container. As the dry wells fill, the ability to absorb water is diminished, ultimately reaching zero. Once a dry well is full of debris, the water flows to the next one, etc. If all the drywells are full of debris and water, the excess water goes to the second system. The second system consist of larger grates that allow the water to flow into our ponds. Again, if you wash dirt and debris from the street into these grates, the entrance to the ponds fill up and eventually need cleaned. If you wash your car in your drive way, the soap and road grime from your car will end up in our dry wells and ponds – polluting the pond water. You may have noticed in the recent heavy rains, we had a huge lake in front of the office and smaller lakes across from Site 165 and much larger one by Sites 300 and 301. The section A ponds have their low side elevation by the office. The other two lakes were at their respective ponds low end elevations. The lakes were formed because the volume of rain simplyoverwhelmed our pumping systems ability to pump the water to the upper end of their ponds. Over time, the excess water was distributed throughout the ponds draining the lakes.

Our Committee is working on a Suggested Cleaning List for Rental Units @ DA, in response to complaints we are hearing about the less than satisfactory conditions of <u>some units</u> presently being occupied by renters. This is a troubling situation as renters tell others about their stay at DA and may not mention that they rented directly from a private owner and not from Desert Aire Resort. If they have complaints, they are directed at our beautiful resort which is not good for either future rentals or sales. When this list is completed and vetted by the Board, a copy will be forwarded to all those signed up to receive Desert Aire E News, both owners & renters. Or ask the office for a copy, when available.

On another topic, I along with some Board members & committee members recently attended a day long symposium concerning operations in managed communities put on by our Management Company, DRM.

Among many very interesting topics covered were rules, regulations & compliance of same. This got me to thinking about responsibilities of owners in regards to having guests visiting or renting out their units. A case that was discussed concerned an owner who felt that rules were not for him, he disregarded what he felt were just minor rules & not all that important. His park would follow their procedures, issuing warning letters etc. which he ignored along with the rules. The park than started registering liens against his property, which he also ignored. After a period of time he put his place up for sale, it sold but could not complete until he paid the liens, which he had ignored costing him \$6000.00.The

Moral of the story is do you know our rules?, do you follow them?, does your visiting company know the park rules, do your renters know the park rules, because if the answer is NO, THAT DOES NOT EXCUSE YOU FROM YOUR FULL RESPONSIBILITY & LIABILITY FROM YOUR & THEIR ACTIONS OR DEEDS. To be a good neighbor in DA & to protect yourself from possible liability, take the time to read in our DA Directory (Blue book) <u>Rules & regulations</u>, page 31-43 (**13 pgs large print** & for your further reading pleasure see <u>Liens & Legal Remedies</u> page 44-49.
