Director.

June Cavendish wished everyone a Happy New Year.

# **SECRETARY'S REPORT** - Judy Bailey

Motion was made for approval of minutes of the December 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019 Open Board Meeting. Approved and seconded by Barry Rutz.

Motion was made for approval to accept Bill 323 (election rules). Approved and seconded by Barry Rutz.

**TREASURER'S REPORT** - Judy Bailey for Marilyn Kopernick

Thank you to the finance committee, Bob Langin, Steve Such, Hope Hilliard and Anne King. Operating fund: Operating expenses for the ten months are \$47K better than budget. The positive variance in payroll (\$28K). This is due to the replacement of one full time housekeeping position with a part time position. The pool management is now "in house", a saving of \$8K. Utilities are the only category unfavorable due to DRM including an extra month. Gas costs and refuse costs are higher.

A motion to accept the November 2019 financial reports received from DRM, as corrected by the finance committee and approved by the Financial Review Subcommittee was approved and seconded by Dave Haines.

Reserve Fund: The balance if \$461K, a decrease of \$41K during the year. \$216K has been paid in Reserve Fund expenses so far this year. Bathroom renovations make up the bulk of the expenditures at \$159K to date. Pool filters and salt cell expenditures are \$10K and \$8K for the Billiard Room renovations.

Carolyn gave a reminder that all renters must pay the Administration/Resort fee and that owners should tell the renters. Also to bring the correct change (\$25).

Keep your lot free of overgrown shrubs by trimming when needed. Remove debris or dying plants from your lot's flowerbeds. Pull the weeds. Do your part to keep our park looking its best **all season long**.

### **BUILDING & GROUNDS COMMITTEE**

January once again finds Buildings and Grounds very busy with various projects.

First off, some owners have approached me with the idea of replacing the water piping and valves directly serving their unit. Undoubtedly, some of the piping and valves need replacing and preventative maintenance is wise. The huge problem is that to replace the main valve at the unit, the whole section of the park needs to be shut down. If you are planning to make such upgrades to your water service, register with Carolyn in the office. She will notify you when a planned shutdown is scheduled so that you can schedule your particular maintenance. She needs to know, so that your project can be checked before the system is recharged with water pressure.

# NOTE: Remember to turn off the electricity to your hot water heater when the water is shut off.

The main swimming pool pump in the B pool failed. The bid from the local pool service company was for \$900. Our B & G Team procured a new pump for \$300 and installed it.

A permanent solution to the Spa/main pool shower has been created. The old shower was

closed because the deck was always wet and folks entering the Poker Room walked through it. The new shower is located on the exterior side of the Spa facing the pool. It has no mixing valve to control the hot and cold water and is controlled by a pull chain so you don't have to remember to turn the water off when you are through showering.

We have installed 26 pegs for hanging clothes in the new women's dressing room. We are in the process of doing the same thing in the new men's dressing room and the dressing rooms in both the A and B buildings.

We recognize the need to repair the cracks in the streets. The commercial work done three years ago was not satisfactory. The large cracks were not filled prior to the application of tar, thus the tar gets hot and collapses in the underlying cracks. Our B and G Team is talking with commercial firms to learn what needs to be done. It appears that our guys will be able to affect a satisfactory repair. When we are ready to begin repairs, we will need more volunteers. We put out the call and 10 volunteers showed up and did the job in B section. Thanks for a great job men!

The gazebo on the putting green needs some extensive repair and rebuilding. We are looking for 2 or 3 good carpenters to head up that task. If you have the qualifications and would like to volunteer for this project, please contact me.

Fun Fact Made Better: I have extolled the virtue of using vinegar in several ways. One of those was wrapping a vinegar soaked cloth around a hose bib to dissolve the deposits from hard water, so that you can easily attach and detach the garden hose. In trying it myself, I found that it doesn't always work as advertised. Therefore, I next filled a small ziplock bag with vinegar and fixed it around the faucet, immersing it in the vinegar. In 24 to 48 hours all the deposits are gone and the faucet works like new.

Our Red Binder does have a very comprehensive plan. Some key points are:

- Make sure everyone at Desert Aire is OK and accounted for.
- Complete a survey of our homes, RV's & buildings & report or mitigate any problems.

Our plan sends our Searchers to complete these tasks, but we can ALL help. We cannot at any given point in time be sure that everyone assigned to these tasks is here in the park.

So, this is what you can do:

Make sure you and your house mate are safe.

- 1. Check your home or RV for water leaks, propane leaks or electrical issues.
- 2. Turn off utilities as necessary.

What I will also ask you to do is to check on your neighbors. If every capable person checks on your neighbors 2 doors to your left, 2 doors to you right and a few more if possible, we can complete this task with your help.

Look for Searchers with a radio & report what you have found or come find me at the Clubhouse Patio. Your assistance will be greatly appreciated.
