COMMENTS FROM THE PRESIDENT

Call to order in the telephone/internet meeting mode. Many thanks to the volunteers who picked up the trash while the crew was off, and to Gerry Page who coordinated the activity and Dick Cowan who assisted.

Night lights at the entrance have received attention by volunteers and are now working.

Maurice Fitzgerald has begun work on returning lights to the palm trees.

Dave Haines has ordered new pumps for pond use, and would welcome volunteer help. Thank you Dave for your hard work and your accomplishments.

The Board has allocated funds for a pond cleaning contractor, to be selected.

It is good practice for residents who notice maintenance needs to notify the office

SECRETARY'S REPORT – Steve Harvey

Approval of the minutes of the November Open

Board meeting was proposed, seconded by Barry, and passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Marilyn Kopernick

Thanks to the Finance Committee for its contribution in assistance to the Treasurer's function. Nine months actual results are \$39,000 better than plan, mostly due to lower wage expense resulting from one employee off injured as well as lower supervisory costs. Insurance and repairs and maintenance costs have been slightly above plan. No dues increase is indicated for the coming year. The good financial condition allows a transfer of \$20,000 from the operation fund to the reserve fund. The reserve fund, which is used to replace worn out or deteriorated assets in our park, will have grown by about \$130,000 by the year end.

MOTIONS BY THE TREASURER

I move that the board accept the March to October 2020 Financial Statements from DRM and approved by the Financial Review Subcommittee. Seconded by Barry and passed.

I move that the board approve a transfer of \$20,000 from the operating account to the reserve account. Seconded by Steve and passed.

I move that the board appoint Wayne Carlson of Brabo & Carlson as the Desert Aire. Resort Auditor for 2021. Seconded by Barry, and passed.

MANAGEMENT REPORT – Carolyn Quintana

Tony is off, due to Covid in his family. He will take 2 Covid tests prior to returning.

Christina is back as of Dec. 1.

The Toy Luncheon donations – unwrapped toys will be appreciated Dec 1 to 8th.

Barb Eggiman attended the meeting and indicated that the park is looking good when considering the number of members absent. Absent members who wish to ensure gardens are weeded and watered should be in touch with YA Landscaping to keep in the loop. Lot 57 was maintained in the past with the trust owner paying Alfonso's charges, but it needs to be restarted.

No report. A security company was hired for one month following the end of season break-ins and car thefts. Barry presented an ER for that month of \$2160, second Cheryl, passed.

Stan Miller reports that he has agreed with 4 candidates for the to-be open Board positions to fill at the end of this season. State regulations now require a full set of nominees by the end of the calendar year.

Marilyn Kopernick: I move that the board sign a service agreement with Web321 Marketing Ltd for our website maintenance at a cost of \$321 Canadian per month. Second by Barry, passed.

Following are the Bio's for the Candidates to Desert Aire Board of Directors for 2021-2022.

KEN BAILEY, LOT 240

Dear Board of Directors and members of Desert Aire R V Resort:

My name is Ken Bailey and I have been asked to be a candidate to serve on the Board of Directors. My wife Bobbi and I own lot #240 and have been coming to Desert Aire since 2012. We love Desert Aire and meeting all the wonderful people here.

During the summer, we reside in the state of Washington on Haven Lake near the town of Tahuya on the Olympic Peninsula across the Puget Sound from Seattle.

For those of you who don't know me and my wife Bobbi, let me give you a little of our history. We met in high school in Carson City, Nevada and were married in 1964. We both went to Bible College, but my career had been in sales most of my life. Though I had a successful sales career, in 1999 we made a career change going into full time Christian ministry. We served with Campus Crusade's International Ministries for ten years. During that time I was asked by our Fire Chief to consider becoming a volunteer chaplain. After a few years we left Crusade to serve as full time Chaplains to our first responders, both in law enforcement and fire.

By this time we were serving several departments in the Northwest.

A few years after coming to Desert Aire I was asked by some deputies to be their chaplain here at the Riverside County Sheriff's Office. I was hesitant at first, but then reconsidered and began serving the Sheriff's Office in 2016. Bobbi has since been asked to serve as well. She is the first and only female Chaplain in RCSO who has over 5000 deputies. During the summer we still serve Washington State Patrol and Kitsap County Sheriff's Office in Washington.

If elected to the Board I will do my best to serve and honor the wishes of the members of the Desert Aire RV Resort Owners Association.

CHERYL BOYER, LOT 297

Desert Aire is a special place and my husband Leroy (aka Chico) and I first discovered it while staying here several times before 2011 at our friend's park model on lot 92. It was sold in 2011. We'd fallen in love with our experiences here and fortunately found 309 and were renters at that unit from 2012 until the spring of 2017. We purchased our park model in March of 2017. When we're not enjoying Desert Aire our permanent home is in Portland, Oregon. We have two wonderful married sons and two daughter-in-law and five grandchildren that we dearly love.

To better help you evaluate my qualifications in seeking a position on the Board of Directors I'd like to share how I see myself. I consider myself a people person, leader and team player, global thinker and problem solver. My professional career was as a registered nurse in the operating room working early in my career in open heart surgery. I attended a hospital based school of nursing then later returned to school and completed my business degree, Bachelor of Science in Health Care Administration. This degree along with my nursing skills allowed me to pursue management positions. I've held staff

nurse, charge nurse, supervisor and OR manager positions. As OR manager at large hospital in Portland I had 140 direct report employees and a multi-million dollar budget. This was a position overseeing patient care and staff needs, all while on multiple committees and daily interacting with many hospital departments. After my retirement from the hospital I was a clinical consultant for a small medical device company for seven years and traveled to hospitals all over the US training operating room nurses.

At Desert Aire I have been Coordinator of the Medical Committee, part of the Emergency Preparedness Team and am now assistant Chair of the Emergency Preparedness Team. I was responsible for implementation of our Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) use and training three years ago. Since then I've held classes annually and have trained approximately 165 people in chest compression CPR and use of our AED. I am a Red Cross Certified CPR and Basic First Aid Instructor. Also, I am a member of the Landscape & Design Committee and Space Allocation Committee.

Desert Aire needs a leadership team dedicated to not only to all the owners, renters and employees but to the continued fiscal responsibility for maintenance and improvement of the park infrastructure. It is such an amazing community, as I say my "summer camp" for seniors but during the winter and it would be an honor to be part of this leadership team.

BUILDING & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

The last month has been particularly busy for those Building and Grounds folks that are in residence.

As this issue goes to press, we are taking

delivery of the new tractor. It is a Kubota equipped with a front-end loader and a three-point hitch in the rear. Bill Wilson did a lot of background research on this project. We purchased it from a local dealer.

Richerd Jinnings is being trained by the dealer in the operation and maintenance of the tractor. He will then train our crew in the proper operation and the required maintenance. Anyone who wants to use the tractor will need to be checked out and approved by Richerd.

Gerry Page led the repair of the storm damage to the roof of the Club House. Some of the metal wall caps had loosened and in one case had been twisted by the wind.

Also, the temporary protection that John Rumsey had constructed to protect the pool restrooms had sustained damage and required some attention.

Will Babcock led the construction of the cover for the pond pump located at rear of lot 266. The cover is designed to not only cover the pump, but to be easily removed for maintenance and to provide sound attenuation.

Gerry Page led the effort to collect garbage, recycling, and yard debris while the crew was in Covid isolation. In typical Desert Aire spirit, there was a large group of folks that assisted. Among the many volunteers are: Richerd Jinnings, Ed Christy, Kathy Cummings, Neal Cummings, Tom Case, Wade Hartley, Will Babcock, Char Mardock, Dean Mick, John Sullivan, Jeanette Trussell, Carol Malcolm and Dan Malcolm. If you participated and we've failed to mention your name please accept our apologies – your efforts were truly appreciated.

Mathew Felix has taken charge of the pool chemistry. He is a new owner already infected with the Desert Aire spirit of volunteerism and just happens to have a wide background in pool maintenance. When you see Matt working

around the pools, please take a minute to welcome him to our community and thank him for his already huge contributions.

Relieved of pool duties, Dave moved over to irrigation duty with only two catfish in one week plugging the canal water irrigation system.

We have started to install the new pond aerators. Gerry Page, Richerd Jinnings, Bill Wilson, and Dave helped with installation of two aerating fountains and one aerator. These differ from the old system of fountains where we have a submersible pump with a PVC stem and a cap with holes drilled in it. The new aerators float on the surface and are designed to get large volumes of water airborne while keeping the plume low so that the wind won't blow water onto the adjacent properties. We will continue to use the home-made versions that are currently installed and working. All are part of the scheme to add more oxygen to the water which will help prevent the growth of algae. Additional work is being done to direct water flow to and through areas that tend to stagnate which will also help with the algae problem. We are confident that we are following the correct path to solve many of the pond problems.

Dave has done considerable research on the subject and recently we have had conversations with professionals that have given us positive feedback. There is still much work to be done on the ponds.

Danny Cavendish led the semi-annual project to replace the 24 AC filters in the common buildings.

All street lights, path lights and security lights around the park are working. Jesse Lopis of our crew has diligently worked to repair all that were inoperable. In addition, the lights at the base of the palm trees on both sides of the boulevard at our entrance and those along 49th Ave are now working. Will Babcock spent most of one afternoon getting the lights aimed at the upper

trunks of the palm trees. Bill Wilson and Will Babcock installed new bulbs on the two security lights at the entrance and they are now working properly. If you see any light not working throughout the common areas of the park or common buildings, please inform Carolyn or a member of the Building and Grounds Committee. It is difficult to know about an inoperable light during daylight.

In addition to the above more visible projects, the B & G group is constantly repairing or replacing a wide range of items that are important to the daily function of Desert Aire. For example, such items can be the changing of a battery in a wall clock, removing a bird's nest from the building, repairing a leaking faucet or replacing the bulb in an "Exit" sign. If you see something that needs attention, please tell Carolyn or a member of the Building and Grounds Committee.

Lastly, while not directly part of B & G, I would like to commend and thank Ross Clement, Susie Terry and Dean and Marilou Mick for volunteering to keep the discards left in Lot 4 sorted and cleaned out. Their presence has already made a positive difference.

This newsletter article is a repeat of what I wrote for November. I feel like we will have some members arriving in January and these reminders would be worth reprinting.

Here are my reminders for this time of year.

1. Replace the batteries in your smoke detector and your carbon monoxide detector.
2. Check your fire extinguisher. Check the gauge to make sure it has pressure.
3. Stock up on supplies to last at least 72 hours.
4. The most important items to have on hand would be these.
 - Water

- Non-perishable food
- A supply of medication
- Some cash
- Flashlights & batteries

Please see your Red Emergency Binder for a complete list.

Having supplies on hand this year is especially important. As we saw earlier this year, our supply chain can be interrupted if COVID-19 spikes.

With a much smaller group of members in the park this year, we will need everyone's help. In case of a disaster, I am asking everyone to check on their neighbors to make sure everyone is safe and accounted for.

Please be sure to follow all of the COVID-19 precautions and take them seriously. These include social distancing, wearing masks, hand washing and avoiding crowds.
