BUILDING & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

The 2020/2021 season for the B&G crew was extremely busy and productive.

Finding a solution for the water quality of the ponds continues. It is a process of self education because there isn’t a manual on the subject. We have gleaned hints and ideas from the professional folks we have talked with and Dave has expended extensive hours investigating and studying the subject. The chemicals Alfonso used are now illegal to use and have been delivered to a hazardous waste facility. The new processes use an oxidizer to kill the algae. Enzymes and bacteria are introduced to the system to digest the dead algae which helps prevent the sludge build-up on the bottom of the ponds. Part of the process is to add oxygen to the water via aerators which discourages the growth of algae. In April/May, volunteers and staff did some weed removal but alas, the stuff grows like weeds and is already on its way back. This tells us that we need to clean the accumulated sludge from the bottom of the ponds. On the plus side, we have been able to control algae growth with our new products which keeps water clarity good. Getting the process and proper amounts of ingredients seems to be more alchemy than formula. A key part of the process in the future, will be to find and repair leaks where contaminated water reenters the ponds. The process and results are often frustrating for everyone, so please don’t try to help the process by adding your home remedies to the system. The whole problem has been years in the making and can’t be solved over night without hiring expensive outside help. The work goes on!

Work to clean the mud and muck from the NE corner of the NE pond by the B&G crew revealed

that pumps in place to deal with overflow and flooding no longer worked and in fact there seems to be a bit of a mystery where the excess water is supposed to be going when the pumps do work. Obviously, we have more work to do to learn all we need to know about the infrastructure and operation and maintenance of the ponds. While on the subject of out of order pumps, just at the end of the season, it came to our attention there's a couple of pumps in the SE corner of the park that are on the streets edge but no longer work because of defective electrical components with a mystery of where the water is supposed to go when the pumps do work.

As previously announced, the ice machine died over the 2020 summer. We purchased and installed a new ice machine for the kitchen that is very similar to the old one. Our crew is enjoying the use of it during the summer months.

After extensive searching, we finally located suitable replacement sockets for the cone wall light fixtures that hang on the exterior of the clubhouse, mostly over doors. Over the years, the electrical sockets eroded to the point of being non-functional. Jesse will rebuild the fixtures over the summer.

The decks and coping edges of all three pools will be refurbished early this summer.

Prep work around the main pool has already begun. The most extensive work will be required around the clubhouse pool. In addition, the sloping sidewalk from the spa towards the main entrance will also have cool decking installed because of it being so slippery when wet. Also, the area under the shower will be ground so water will flow from the building to the flower beds and then will be cool decked also. Dave and Don Hammond have organized this project.

The experimental solar light located near the office continues to perform well. We have been able to experiment with variable heights and

tilting the light from parallel to the ground to an upward angle of 30 degrees. We have found that when the light is mounted at 11 feet from the ground and tilted 30 degrees upwards, the cone of light extends over the width of the street and about 78 feet along the street. The interesting thing is that the solar light's entire energy is focused at the ground where our current street light's energy is a ball of light 6 feet from the ground. When viewed from adjacent properties, the solar light appears as a point of light in the distance. Both lights emit light at about the same energy level. We have left the solar light mounted and functioning through the summer to see how it survives multiple 100 plus degree days.

At the end of the season, the B & G crew led by Richard Jinnings conducted a survey of the in-ground garbage cans and receptacles throughout the residential portion of the park. The system consists of multiple sized containers by multiple manufacturers. The in-ground canisters are deteriorating and some need replacing now. The garbage pails that slide into the in-ground canisters are rotting with several missing the entire bottom of the can. Lids have been run over, bent, broken or otherwise damaged. Deterioration of the system is a huge problem because there is only one supplier whose product is overpriced and of significantly inferior quality – we have a few installed which are already failing. The B & G folks have a few schemes in mind that are within our abilities to create quality components and will be a good solution at a reasonable cost. We are hopeful the fall will find our most capable fabricators in residence lending their expertise to the solution.

As part of their summer work schedule, our staff have upgraded the flower beds and shrub irrigation systems. Soon they will paint the retaining walls.

The B & G Crew acknowledges the many residents that contributed to the upgrade and

functioning of the park's facilities over the 2020/2021 season. Projects such as the conversion of the majority of fluorescent fixtures to LED bulbs, researching and purchasing the new tractor, cleaning and organization of storerooms and the shop, making all the street lights work and making the lights that light the palm trees at the entrance work required large numbers of hours. The ongoing work with the ponds has taken untold hours of time. Upgrading the functioning and day to day operation of the pools has required experience and dedication to the task every day – even through the summer. It was inspiring the way folks rallied to the need and organized garbage and recycling collection for the two weeks the crew was out with COVID. Other projects like the cleaning and organization of LOT 4 initially required a significant investment of time and needs constant monitoring. The replacement of roofs on the common buildings continued this year. The quick organization of folks to pick and distribute unused fruit in the park was a meaningful aid in the control of unwanted critters and a big aid to the mission with so many hungry people to feed. A huge thanks to all participants for your efforts on these projects and all the others that were accomplished this past season which reminds us why Desert Aire is the BEST. Please remember to cut any yard debris into small pieces when you put it out for pickup. The smaller pieces allow for greater efficiency when loading the trailer for transport.

If you see something in the park or one of the facilities that requires attention, please tell Carolyn or a member of the Building and Grounds Committee. It is particularly important to report lights that aren't working so they can be promptly repaired.
